Favourite books were: A month in the country by J L Carr, Mothering Sunday by Graham Swift, Small Things Like These by Claire Keegan (all these have been made into excellent films), Still Life by Sarah Winman, The Summer Book, by Tove Jannsen, Half of a Yellow Sun by Chimamanda Ngozi Adiche (catch her excellent TED talk We should all be feminists on YouTube), A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles, Taking the Lead by John Crace, Silk Roads by Peter Frankopan, Black and British by David Olusoga – these last two books are non-fiction.
